Chair's update

Welcome to the 50th edition of your bi-annual Supporter Newsletter.

This milestone represents 25 years of communicating the impact of your wonderful generosity on the lives and futures of others.

It has also prompted me to reflect on the importance of our partnerships with you, our clinical trial participants and our researchers. This unique collaboration is critical to the progress we've made and will influence the discoveries yet to come.

An example of this is the 12-year analysis of the TEXT and SOFT clinical trials which involved 5,738 women internationally including 489 from Australia and New Zealand. The outcomes of this research first reported in 2014 and 2015 respectively, changed the treatments available for premenopausal women with breast cancer. The 12-year analysis of participants in these trials, reported in your Research Update, has shown how important this treatment has been to their outcomes indicating the broader impact to all women who now also receive this treatment approach.

Breast Cancer Trials has been pleased to work in collaboration with many other medical research groups on a new Australian data resource initiative, HeSANDA. This new resource catalogues previously published research so that it may be used for secondary research purposes. This has the potential to identify gaps in knowledge, fast-track new areas of research and expedite the discovery of new health related benefits which otherwise may take many years.

Over 300 of our researchers will soon come together for our Annual Scientific Meeting. It's an important event in our calendar where we share knowledge, update on research results and progress, plan new breast cancer research and prioritise areas of unmet patient need.

Whether you are a new supporter, or you have been with us on this journey for some or all of the past 25+ years – thank you. You've made possible the many breakthroughs which today benefit breast cancer patients and their families.

I look forward to keeping you informed of the next breakthrough that we make together.

Research updates

Your support is critical in helping further our research into better treatments and outcomes. This follow up of two important clinical trials shows how your generosity continues to benefit people through new treatment approaches.

Suppressing ovarian function increases breast cancer survival in high-risk premenopausal women

Two scientific papers published in December 2022, reported on the latest analysis of data from two long-term international clinical trials conducted by Breast Cancer Trials and generously supported by our donors.

The Suppression of Ovarian Function Trial (SOFT) and the Tamoxifen and Exemestane Trial (TEXT) involved thousands of women from all over the world, including 489 from Australia and New Zealand. These trials are investigating the effects of different hormone treatment combinations on survival and the recurrence of cancer in premenopausal women.

The recent analysis shows that the addition of ovarian suppression is providing at least a 4% improvement in overall survival at 12 years.

Among premenopausal women with breast cancer, 80% have hormone-responsive breast cancer, where the hormone oestrogen can stimulate the growth of cancer cells. To stop this from happening to any cancer cells that remain after the primary breast cancer has been removed, women may be given one or more hormone blocking drugs. These either prevent the uptake of oestrogen by cells (oestrogen blockers like tamoxifen), switch off the production of oestrogen in the ovaries (ovarian function suppression), or block oestrogen production in body fat (aromatase inhibitors such as exemestane).

The research partly stemmed from the observation that women under the age of 35 treated for hormone receptor positive breast cancer often had worse outcomes than women closer to menopause. One suggestion was that by placing younger women into a state of menopause, by suppressing their ovaries, might help prevent recurrence of the cancer.

Professor Prue Francis, the BCT Principal Investigator for SOFT and TEXT and the international co-chair of SOFT and chair of the international steering committee for both trials, says "At 12 years in SOFT, we can now see that some sub-groups of women at particularly high

risk of recurrence seem to benefit from the more intense endocrine therapy with ovarian function suppression and exemestane." They include women with larger tumours, who had chemotherapy before surgery. "Also, women under 35 look like they are getting a good survival benefit from ovarian suppression, and those with aggressive grade-3 tumours."

Women with a lower risk of breast cancer recurrence have on average had good outcomes using tamoxifen alone without ovarian suppression. "This is a reassuring finding, that there are premenopausal women who don't need chemotherapy and don't need ovarian suppression. More than 95% in this [low risk] group who did not receive chemotherapy are still alive."

After 12 years the combined TEXT-SOFT analysis shows a continuation of trends that became apparent after five and eight years. Treatment with exemestane and ovarian suppression significantly improved disease-free survival and reduced distant metastases compared to tamoxifen and ovarian suppression.

There are important considerations for patients when it comes to seeing increased effectiveness of the treatment and increased side effects associated with that treatment, which requires personalised decision making. Professor Francis says, "Aromatase inhibitors (like exemestane) can have challenging side-effects. They certainly can cause more musculoskeletal complaints. They are harder on your sex life and can cause more loss of bone density. Tamoxifen has side-effects, such as increasing the risk of blood clots, but these are not common."

"I now wonder if in fact my breast cancer may have been hereditary."

Kaylene's breast cancer diagnosis in 2011 came as quite a shock. Having lost her mother at the age of 15, Kaylene really did not know if there was a history of breast cancer in her family.

After undergoing radiation treatment, Kaylene was given the all clear.

Kaylene could not believe it when in 2014, only three years after her last diagnosis, something showed in her annual mammogram in her opposite breast. Her doctor told her that it was breast cancer and that she would need to undergo treatment once again.

While Kaylene has not participated in a clinical trial herself, she believes that the work carried out by Breast Cancer Trials is extremely important in making a profound difference to the treatment of breast cancer now and well into the future.

Not only does Kaylene support Breast Cancer Trials by purchasing The Australian Women's Health Diary each year, she has also decided to leave Breast Cancer Trials a gift in her Will, hoping to fund new and better treatments.

"I want to ensure my granddaughter and future generations do not have to face the fear and uncertainty that comes with a breast cancer diagnosis, just like I did".








Did you know?

This year Tickford Racing Supercars driver Thomas Randle joined the team which was an exciting addition. They also had their best finish, placing 4th overall.


