

The groundbreaking FINER clinical trial, led by Breast Cancer Trials in partnership with the Canadian Cancer Trials Group, has shown that adding the drug ipatasertib to standard treatment can extend the time that metastatic breast cancer remains under control.

Associate Professor Andrew Redfern, FINER Australian Study Chair, says the results, presented at the American Society of Clinical Oncology (ASCO) Annual Meeting 2025 in June, are significant:

"This treatment is an exciting next step for patients with metastatic breast cancer, providing the benefits of longer cancer control which will hopefully translate into a longer and healthier life.

"It could potentially help up to 1,500 people in Australia every year who are diagnosed with this type of breast cancer, offering a new treatment option for these patients. We now need to confirm these results both with longer follow-up of the patients on this trial as well as with further research," says Professor Redfern.

This breakthrough means even more to women like Madelaine, who joined the FINER clinical trial following her second diagnosis – this time with metastatic breast cancer.

Madelaine considers breast cancer trials to be the stepping stones to the future:

"There were participants in trials before my first diagnosis who made it possible for me to access medication immediately. Now, this is my time to contribute to ensure new, better therapies are available," Madelaine shared.

Chair's update

Mother's Day Appeal

Women like Gemma, who was only 27 when she was diagnosed with breast cancer. Thanks to your support of breast cancer research, including the Prevention of Early Menopause Study (POEMS) clinical trial, a breakthrough medication called goserelin was made available to help preserve the fertility of premenopausal women like Gemma during treatment.

Study Chair Dr Belinda Kiely shared:

"We truly couldn't run clinical trials without our incredible donors – you make everything possible. Thank you for enabling OPTIMA-Young – a trial that will make a real difference for young Australians facing breast cancer."

OPTIMA-Young could help identify young people with hormone receptor positive breast cancer that need chemotherapy, as well as those who can avoid it, without compromising their survival.

"This randomised trial will help determine if genomic testing can identify young women who can do just as well with hormone-blocking therapy alone – safely sparing them from the side effects of chemotherapy," said Dr Kiely.

This could be life-changing for women like Angela, diagnosed at just 38. Chemotherapy saved her life but also deeply affected her health and sense of identity. Angela said:

"Chemo knocked me for six. People still don't recognise me. If my story helps raise funds for research – so people like me could survive breast cancer without chemotherapy, that would be amazing."

Groundbreaking immunotherapy research shows promising results in metastatic breast cancer patients

Our DIAmOND clinical trial – developed by Australian researchers and conducted by Breast Cancer Trials – is the first study to test whether combining dual immunotherapy with trastuzumab (Herceptin) can extend cancer control in patients with metastatic HER2 positive breast cancer.

Results have shown clinically worthwhile response rates and cancer control, along with an acceptable side effect profile – indicating potential long-term benefits in prolonging lives and improving quality of life.

Study Chair, Professor Sherene Loi said, "These promising results may offer a new treatment option for patients with treatment resistant HER2 positive breast cancer.

"They provide a compelling case for further exploration and how we can best integrate this treatment combination into clinical practice."

Your impact in enhancing quality of life beyond breast cancer

When someone is diagnosed with breast cancer, treatment is just one part of their journey. Cancer and treatment can cast a long shadow, with short and long-term side effects, and impacts on physical, emotional and mental wellbeing.

But thanks to supporters like you who fund clinical trials, our researchers are advancing innovative studies in 'supportive care' to find more targeted, less invasive treatments that improve quality of life for patients.

These include groundbreaking trials such as POEMS, TAILORx and IBCSG-23, which have proven treatment options that help preserve fertility, reduce side effects, and allow patients to safely avoid extensive surgery.

New trials launching this year, such as OPTIMA-Young and ROSALIE, are exploring how some patients may be able to safely avoid chemotherapy and radiotherapy.

Professor Boon Chua, Study Chair of the ROSALIE trial, said: "We may be able to identify patients with low, and very low, risk who are unlikely to benefit from radiotherapy. Supporting these patients in their ability to avoid overtreatment means they could avoid unnecessary treatment toxicity, financial cost, and logistical challenges."

Advocating for patient-centred care

Leslie Gilham is a passionate advocate for breast cancer research. After her diagnosis, she participated in the TEXT clinical trial, which helped transform the treatment of hormone receptor positive early breast cancer in premenopausal women – leading to fewer recurrences and improved overall survival.

Since 2018, Leslie has chaired our Consumer Advisory Panel (CAP), a highly active group of people who've had breast cancer that ensure patient needs are considered at every stage of trial development. Many CAP members, like Leslie, have participated in trials themselves and provide valuable input on recruitment, consent materials, protocols, and ethical issues.

Leslie volunteered to help ensure future generations, including her daughter's, have access to better breast cancer care.

"The CAP are involved in helping design a clinical trial, so the patient is at the forefront from the start," she says.

After over 14 years of dedicated service, Leslie is stepping down this month. We thank her for her exceptional commitment to amplifying the patient voice and helping change countless lives.

You are helping reach more patients

Clinical trial access is often limited by strict eligibility criteria and location, which means those in regional areas can miss out. But we're trialling a new remote telehealth prescreening process with our OLIO study.

This new approach allows researchers to pre-screen more patients, improve participant diversity and make trial results more representative. Dr Sarah Zardawi, medical oncologist and clinical fellow, explains:

"Our project is about reaching more patients, particularly those who are eligible for increasingly specific clinical trials, but who may not live in metropolitan areas. We've made participation much easier. We hope this approach can be applied to more breast cancer trials in the future."

The impact is already clear for patients like Rebecca, diagnosed at 42 and living in Mildura, Victoria, with her husband Matt and two young daughters, Daphne and Dorothy.

"Living regionally, travelling would've made everything much harder. The remote prescreening was simple and gave me real hope – that I could still access cutting-edge trials and help change the future for others like me," said Rebecca.

Young women like Rebecca are more likely to have an aggressive breast cancer with a higher risk of recurrence compared to older women. OLIO is trialling a new targeted treatment that may improve her survival, and if proven effective, the survival of many others.
